A Christmas Hymn-Sing of Stories, Scripture, Music

- This Hymn-Sing can be used in any non-profit setting or family Christmas gathering.
- Two of the scripture readings are from the *Book of Mormon*.
- The hymns are from the 1985 LDS Hymn Book
- Most of the hymns are intended to be sung by the audience or family group to maximize their participation. If the program needs to be shorter or longer, fewer or most relevant verses of hymns can be sung and stories could be edited for length or others found in the Church's online magazines
- The story references are mostly from the "Mormon Journal" sections (Jan 1975- Dec 1999) of the *Ensign* magazine or the "Latter-day Saint Voices" sections (Jan 2000-Dec 2020) of the *Ensign* or (now) *Liahona* magazines of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (aka LDS or Mormon) at https://www.churchofjesuschrist.org/study/magazines/ensign-19712020? lang=eng
- It is recommended that a printed or visual outline of the program be handed out or posted so the audience can anticipate the music
- In the readings, please remember to reference the title & author of the story / poem / scripture / music
- Art work can be used to enhance the presentation

"And Hear the Angels Sing"

MUSIC: "Angels We Have Heard on High" • 1985 LDS Hymn Book-203, vv. 1,2,3

Reader 1: Edmund H. Sears, a Unitarian minister of the mid-1800's wrote a five-verse poem that

he titled: "Peace on Earth" where he expressed his longing for the day when peace and goodwill would envelop the world. It soon became the popular carol: "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear" where we sing his plea for peoples everywhere to hear the angels sing, even as shepherds did upon a star-lit hillside—over 2000 years ago. Our LDS hymn #207 contains only verses 1, 2, and 5 of his poem. We will begin with verses 1 & 2.

Reader 2: Verses 3 & 4 of Edmund Sears' "Peace on Earth"

Reader 3: Wars and troubles still rage, and yet in every corner of our world, there are those who

clearly hear the angels sing—men, women, and children whose deeds of peace and goodwill reflect the Savior's love and mission—faithful servants who understand that what they do for others, they do also for their Savior born so long ago in Bethlehem—

latter-day angels whose songs are sung in the Christ-like deeds of everyday.

Luke 2:6-7: And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in

swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the

inns.

Reader 3: Luke 2:8-14: And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field,

keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this *shall be* a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth

peace, good will toward men.

Reader 1: 1 Nephi 11:18-21: And [the angel] said unto me: Behold, the virgin whom thou seest is

And it came to pass that I beheld that she was carried away in the Spirit; and after she had been carried away in the Spirit for the space of a time the angel spake unto me, saying: Look! And I looked and beheld the virgin again, bearing a child in her arms. And the angel said unto me:

Behold the Lamb of God, yea, even the Son of the Eternal Father!

The Gifts of Christmas by John A. Widtsoe

... Our first gift at Christmas should be to the Lord; next to the friend or stranger by our gate; then, surcharged with the effulgence from such giving, we would enhance the value of our gifts to our very own. ... How can we give to the Lord? What shall we give to him? Every kind word to our own, every help given them, is as a gift to God, whose chief concern is the welfare of his children. Every gentle deed to our neighbor, every kindness to the poor and suffering, is a gift to the Lord, before whom all mankind are equal. Every conformity to the Lord's plan of salvation—and this is of first importance—is a direct gift to God, for thereby we fit ourselves more nearly for our divinely planned destiny (Ensign, Dec 1972).
