Reader 1: The Perfect Answer as told by Maxine Smith Reeder (used with permission)

"As the mother of 10 children, my daughter, Linda, has made a goal to have, as one might say, "a house of order with every needful thing prepared and arranged for." A few months ago, she came to Cardston to help me move into the Chinook Lodge—bringing two of her daughters who were excited to visit their Canadian cousins. The plan was all set. They had just a few days and were to leave at noon precisely, on the day set for their return journey home to Utah. But as the day dawned and the time for departure loomed ahead, her children and their cousins came to my daughter and pleaded unrelentingly for a little more time together. My daughter was adamant that they follow the schedule that had been set, and that they should make the best of the time they had left and not spend it on fruitless pleas. However, as the appointed hour neared, the pleas grew more desperate. My daughter quietly retired from the discussion as the dejected children tried to prepare for their good-byes. But several minutes later, my daughter returned to announce to the jubilant children that plans had changed—they would be leaving bright and early the next day. Then she shared with them her reasons for consenting to a change of plan.

"She had not gone to finish packing as the children had thought, but had gone to seek the Lord's counsel. She had prayed to know what was the proper course of action in this difference of opinion and then had randomly opened her scriptures to find her attention riveted to the words topping page 372 of her Bible —words giving perfect answer to her dilemma. It was so perfect and startling that she laughed aloud—to think that words written over two thousand years ago could have so perfectly anticipated her latter-day need. Startling, too, because her answer came in the last half of a verse that had been broken in two by a page-break. That very page break allowed for the perfect answer. Her question had been: "Should I accede to the children's wishes or proceed with our predetermined course?" Her answer read:

... lodge here, that thine heart may be merry; and to morrow get you early on your way, that thou mayest go home."

(Holy Bible KJV, p:372; Judges 19:9; Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints)

Yes, it was the perfect answer to a mother's simple prayer, but it was more than that. It was a witness that a loving God is mindful even of the seemingly small concerns of His children, and that when His children seek His will, they often find their perfect answers in Holy and Inspired words.
